



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BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education is comprised of seven members elected by district residents at the annual election and budget vote held each Spring. Board members serve without pay for staggered three-year terms.

Under the Education Law of New York State, the Board of Education is responsible for establishing policies which govern the education of all children attending district schools; for preparing the annual budget; and for ensuring district adherence to state law and regulations. As Chief School Officer, the Superintendent of Schools is charged with seeing that School Board polices are carried out.

Unless otherwise announced, regular meetings of the Adirondack Central School Board of Education are held on the second Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the High School Large Group Instruction Room. Additional Board meetings will be held the fourth Tuesday of each month on an as-needed basis. Residents are encouraged to attend these meetings.

High School Student Schedules

Schedules for students in grades 9-12 will be distributed on the first day of school. Parents and students should take a few moments to review the schedule.

Much time, effort, and decision-making goes into the development of the students' schedules in the Spring of each year. To withdraw from a course in the first two weeks of the course, the student must submit the request to his/her counselor, with written permission from a parent.

A withdrawal from a course needs to be seriously considered by all parties. Every effort should be made by the student to seek another course of instruction if the withdrawal from the original course is granted.

Graduation Requirements

To be eligible for graduation from Adirondack Central School in June 2024, students must fulfill all requirements specified by the Adirondack Board of Education and the New York State Education Department. Each student must meet testing requirements in Mathematics, Science, Global Studies, US History, and English. Please contact your guidance counselor for specific requirements and for the most up-to-date information at 942-9200 ext:5521.

Graduation Policies

The following local policies affecting graduation should be carefully noted:

- 1. Each student must take at least five and one-half credits per year.
- Physical education is required for graduation and students will receive 1/2 unit of credit per year.
- 3. Students must have completed all graduation requirements in order to participate in the graduation ceremony.

Working Papers

Adirondack Central School cooperates with the New York State Labor Department in the issuance of working papers required by law for minors, ages 14-18 who work part-time or full-time employment. Students must submit proof of age and must have had a physical examination within the previous six months. Students must apply in person and sign in the presence of a school official. A parent's signature is also required on the application. Working papers are issued through the H.S./M.S. main offices.

Access to Student Records

A parent, guardian, or student over the age of 18 has access to his/her child's or his/her own school records according to a federal law known as the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. (Any records maintained by a school district as part of the official record are available for review by the parent or the student after reaching age 18.) The law also controls sharing of pupil records with third party individuals or agencies. To request access to records or to ask questions regarding this law, please contact the student's building principal.

Social and Emotional Support Services

We care about our students' total well-being, and we also recognize that a student's academic performance can be greatly affected by his/her physical, mental, and emotional health. Therefore, we offer a network of professional personnel and resources to provide both prevention and intervention assistance to students and their families when help is needed in areas such as substance abuse prevention, pregnancy, peer conflict resolution, divorce, suicide prevention, and other issues.

Many of our staff members are trained in intervention procedures, and a number of prevention and intervention programs are available in our schools. We also have collaborative partnerships with various municipal agencies to provide better delivery of services to children and families.

Special Health Needs

Please notify the school nurse if your child has any special health needs. This confidential information is important to a successful school experience. Examples of such special health needs include bee sting allergy and/or allergy to any other substance; difficulty with vision, hearing, or speech; and the need for medication during the school day. We need a doctor's statement of food allergies for cafeteria staff and for special equipment such as crutches or walkers, either on a temporary or permanent basis.

A current health/emergency form must be on file in the appropriate school nurse's office. Please update information as needed during the school year.

LEAD SCREENING: Students entering Pre-K must have proof of lead screening.

Health Appraisals and Dental Certificates

Health examinations including body mass index are required for new entrants and in grades Pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11. Students wishing to play interscholastic sports or are requesting work permits must have an annual health exam on file.

All student physicals MUST be documented on the "Required NYS School Health Examination Form" or its electronic equivalent (updated 2023). It is preferred that physicals are completed by your private health care provider, although those not received will be completed by the school physician or nurse practitioner.

Required Health Screenings

During this school year, the following screenings are required or will completed at school:

- Vision including distance and near acuity for all newly entering students, Pre-K or K, grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 11. Color perception for all newly entering students.
- Hearing screening for all newly entering students, Pre-K or K, grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 11.
- Scoliosis (spinal curvature) all girls in grades 5 and 7, boys in grade 9.

Medication in School

New York State law states that no medication can be administered at school except under doctors' orders. Even then, the medication must be given by the school nurse. This includes not only prescription medicines but over-the-counter remedies such as Tylenol, cough syrup, cough drops.

School nurses are permitted to dispense medications during school hours <u>only</u> when:

- 1. Written permission is received from parents.
- 2. Written permission is received from a physician with instructions for administering.
- 3. A parent/guardian delivers the medicine to the nurse's office in a pharmacy container with the label intact. (Ask your pharmacist for a second, smaller container for school doses.) Over-the-counter medications must be in their original unopened packaging with the student's name written on it.

Contact your school nurse regarding self-carry medication.

Do not allow children to carry medicine to school.

Immunization Requirements for 2023-2024 School Year

New York State Law Section 2164 requires certain immunizations (shots) to enter and attend school. Students entering Pre-K must be up to date per current NYS immunization charts. Additional immunizations are required for entrance into Kindergarten and grades 6, 7, and 12. Please check with your health care provider as soon as possible to make sure your child has all the needed immunizations prior to the first day of school. Please send proof of immunization to the school nurse where your child will be attending. Proof of immunization must be any one of the items listed below:

- An immunization certificate signed by your health care provider
- Immunization Registry report (NYSIIS or CIR from NYC) from your health care provider or your county health department
- A blood test (titer) lab report that proves your child is immune to the diseases
- For varicella (chickenpox), a note from your health care provider (MD, NP, PA) which says your child had the disease is also acceptable.

DIGNITY FOR ALL STUDENTS ACT SUMMARY (DASA)

DIGNITY FOR ALL STUDENTS ACT SUMMARY

In September 2010, the New York State Legislature enacted the Dignity for All Students Act (DASA), which took effect on July 1, 2012, to make it the policy of the state to provide all students in New York public schools an environment free of bullying, harassment, and discrimination.

What is the Dignity Act?

- The Dignity Act states that no student shall be subjected to bullying, harassment, or discrimination by employees or students on school property or at a school function based on their actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender, or sex.
- The Act also focuses on the prevention of bullying, harassment, and discriminatory behaviors through the promotion of educational measures meant to positively impact school culture and climate.
- The Act also requires schools to collect and report data regarding material incidents of harassment and discrimination.

The Purpose of the Dignity Act

- New York State's Dignity for All Students Act was established with the broad legislative intent to provide a school environment free of bullying, harassment, and discrimination.
- The goal of the Act is to create a safe and supportive school climate where students can learn and focus, rather than fear of being discriminated against and/or verbally/physically harassed.
- The Act provides a response to the large number of harassed and stigmatized students skipping school and engaging in high-risk behaviors, by prohibiting discrimination in public schools and establishing the basis for protective measures such as training and model policies.

• The Act takes a major step in creating more nurturing environments in all New York public schools.

School Discipline Policy Changes from the Dignity Act

- The Dignity Act emphasizes the creation and maintenance of a positive learning environment for all students.
- As part of its effort to achieve that goal, the Act requires the development of measure, balanced, and age-appropriate responses to the bullying, harassment, and discrimination of students by other students and/or employees on school property, including school functions, with remedies and procedures focusing on intervention and education.
- The Act requires that such remedial responses be included in each school's Code of Conduct and that schools place the focus of discipline on discerning and correcting the reasons why the bullying, harassment, and discrimination occurred.
- The Act provides that remedial responses should be designed to correct the problem behavior, prevent another occurrence of the behavior, and protect the target of the problem behavior.



Transportation



Parents/guardians and children should have a procedure to follow in the event of an emergency early dismissal. Children should know what to do if they come home early and find no one there. Please be sure to make prior arrangements for the care of younger children if no adult will be home during the day. Please send notes to your child's school for alternative drop-off locations. No student, PreK-3rd grade will be dropped off without an adult visible at the door or window.

A Note to Pre-K & Kindergarten Parents

As newcomers to school, Pre-K and Kindergarten children need to know the rules of riding the bus. Please take the time to explain school bus safety rules to your child and escort him/her to the school bus stop so that we can ensure the safety of your child.

School Bus Safety Tips

Waiting for the school bus...

- → Always be on time at the bus stop. (Horns are used for emergencies only; a driver will not toot a horn to let students know the bus is there.)
- Wait quietly and in an orderly manner so that the bus driver can see you.
- Wait for the bus 15 feet off the road. Stand back and away from moving traffic.
- Never accept rides with friendly strangers who offer rides to school.

Getting on the bus...

- → Wait for the bus to come to a complete stop.
- Never crowd around the door of the bus.
- Go directly to a seat and stay seated.

Riding on the bus...

- → Always be courteous to the bus driver and other passengers.
- Remember where the emergency exit is and how to use it.
- Never put your head, arms, or hands out an open window.
- Do not distract the bus driver.
- Do not eat or drink on the bus.

Getting off the school bus...

- → Wait in your seat until the bus comes to a complete stop.
- Stay alert to any moving traffic.
- Never cross the road until the bus driver gives you the crossing signal.

In the winter...

- Dress warmly; wear hats, mittens, and boots.
- → Do not stand or play on snow banks at the bus stop.

Never try to retrieve fallen belongings from around or underneath the bus. Do not run into traffic to retrieve your items.

Safety is Our First Priority

Because your child's safety is our business, it is essential that students behave appropriately while riding the school bus. Any student whose conduct is unacceptable may be suspended from school transportation. Athletics

Athletic Participation

Boys and girls in grades 7 through 12 may take part in interscholastic sports. As athletes and representatives of Adirondack Central School, students participating in interscholastic athletics are expected to maintain high standards of conduct. These standards, as well as disciplinary measures for violations, are set forth in the Regulation for Interscholastic Athletics and the Middle School or High School Student Handbook given to each student athlete. Copies of these regulations are available from Michael O'Donnell, Interim Athletic Director. Additional copies of student handbooks are available from the Middle and High School principals.

Athletic Procedures

All students who would like to participate in Adirondack athletics must fulfill all of the following responsibilities before being allowed to participate in practice or games:

- 1. All athletes must participate in regularly scheduled Physical Education classes to be able to participate in practices or games
- 2. All athletes must attend at least a 1/2 day of school to be able to attend practices or games. Legal excuses i.e. doctor, dentist are the exception to the rule.

Athletic Philosophy

MODIFIED: All students at the seventh and eighth grade levels are encouraged to participate in interscholastic athletic teams. Unless there is an overabundance of students trying out for a particular team or if student safety is a concern, no student will be excluded in the selection process. Students may participate as long as they pass the physical examination and meet the school standards of good citizenship, positive attitude, and good practice attendance.

Basic skill development is stressed at this level. The participant should become versed in the rules of the game. Every effort is made to give equal play to all participants.

JUNIOR VARSITY: Along with refinement of basic skills, increased emphasis is placed on team play and physical conditioning. Although winning is considered important, participants are taught how to cope with losing and crowd influence during athletic contests. An attempt will be made to allow all participants to play. It is recognized, however, that they may not have equal playing time.

<u>VARSITY</u>: Ability and attitude are the determining factors in making the team at the varsity level. The varsity level of competition is the culmination of the high school athletic program. Team play, sportsmanship, individual physical ability, motivation, and mental attitude are very important aspects of competition at this level. Not all participants play in every contest. The team definitely plays to win at this level.

Asbestos Inspection

Section 504 Annual Notice

In accordance with the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, commonly known as Section 504, the Adirondack Central School District hereby notifies disabled children and their parents of the Adirondack Central School District's role under the Regulations to Section 504.

The Adirondack Central School District does not discriminate against persons with disabilities and provides qualified disabled individuals access to all of its activities and programs.

The Act also obligates school districts to identify, evaluate, and extend to every qualified student with a disability residing in the district a free appropriate public education, including modifications, accommodations, specialized instruction or related aids as deemed necessary to meet their educational needs as adequately as the needs of non disabled students. Pesticide Notification

PESTICIDE NOTIFICATION

New York State Law, Section 409-H, and Commissioner's Regulation 155.24, requires all public and non-public elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all students, persons in parental relation, faculty and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically during the school year.

The Adirondack Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty and staff who wish to receive a 48 hour notification of pesticide applications.

The following applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- * Anti-microbial pesticides and products
- * Aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects, including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets
- * Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations or in areas inaccessible to children
- * Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use paste, foam, and gel formulations of insecticides in areas inaccessible to children
- * Nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations or in areas inaccessible to children
- * Boric acid and disodium obtaborate tetrahydrate
- * A product designated by the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as a biopesticide (www.epa.gov/pesticides/biopesticides/)
- * A product classified by the EPA as an exempt material under 40 CFR 152.25
- * An emergency application of a pesticide to protect against an imminent threat to human health
- * A pesticide application which occurs when the facility remains unoccupied for a continuous seventy-two hours following the application.

Notification of Rights Under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act for Elementary and Secondary Schools

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. These rights are:

- (1) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the School receives a request for access. Parents or eligible students should submit to the school principal a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The school official will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.
- (2) The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate. Parents or eligible students may ask the school to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate. They should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate. If the school decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the school will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.
- (3) The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the school as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the school has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.
- (4) The right to file a compliant with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the *School District* to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA are:

*Please Note: there is an "emergency exception" which permits disclosure without consent when necessary to protect the health and safety of the student or other individuals.

Body Mass Index (BMI)

As part of a required school health examination, a student is weighed, and his/her height is measured. These numbers are used to figure out the student's body mass index or 'BMI'. The BMI helps the doctor or nurse know if the student's weight is in a healthy range or is too high or too low. Recent changes to the New York State Education Law require that BMI and weight status group be included as part of the student's school health examination. A sample of school districts will be selected to take part in a survey by the New York State Department of Health. If our school is selected to be part of the survey, we will be reporting to New York State Department of Health information about our students' weight status groups. Only summary information is sent. No names and no information about individual students are sent. However, you may choose to have your child's information excluded from this survey report.

The information sent to the New York State Department of Health will help health officials develop programs that make it easier for children to be healthier.
