# Spring 2023 State Exams 3-8

Adirondack had excellent participation on the 2022 exams, and we expect this to continue in 2023. Taking standardized tests is a long-standing and essential practice in education, and the results provide us valuable information to improve our instruction. Remember, the assessment scores are no longer included in teacher evaluation, and they are solely to give the district data to continually improve.

We have implemented new curriculum: ELA K-5 CKLA, ELA 6-8 Amplify, Mathematics K-5 enVisions, and Mathematics 6-8 Eureka<sup>2</sup>. In addition we have implemented new Rally assessments, as practice for the state exams and for standards-based learning. We are confident that our students and teachers are ready for these exams. All tests are taken on computers (except Sci 8).

Please note that the students in 4th grade typically take a state Science assessment, but this year they will not, since the test is being moved to a 5th grade test in the Spring of 2024. Our current 4th graders will be the first group to take the state Science assessment in 5th grade.

## **<u><b>Transportation Department-EPA Grant**</u>



The district was awarded a grant from the EPA Round 1 for electric buses. Our district will receive \$375,000 each for three buses, and \$20,000 for three bus charging stations. The total grant award was \$1,185,000. The EPA grants were created to assist districts in meeting the zero emissions changes for school buses. As of July 1, 2027, school districts in New York State will only be allowed to purchase zero emissions buses, and by July 1, 2035 all school buses in our fleet must be zero emissions.

# "Parenting Teens Support Night"



On January 24th, 14 parents attended the first "Parenting Teens Support Night" held at the Middle School from 5-7 pm. This event was a collaborative effort between



Adirondack Middle School, Connected Community Schools (CCS), and Center for Family Life and Recovery (CFLR).

Children who attended enjoyed dinner and activities in the CCS Hub. After dinner, the adults in attendance traveled to three sessions. The session topics included: Social Media for Parents, Adolescent Development and Coping Skills, and the Ten Key Skills Kids Need to Thrive in Middle School and Beyond.

This event was a great opportunity for attendees to learn from the presentations, share with each other, discuss the topics, and even find moments of laughter. Positive feedback was received from those who participated. We look forward to another event like this in the future!

# "Adirondack Offers Drivers Ed"

The course offers instruction in both the theory and practice of driving. This is a half year course with three class periods per six- day cycle and three periods for road training each cycle, out of the six day cycle. The classroom instruction includes specialized safety instruction, the basic knowledge and information necessary for exercising good driving judgment along with demonstrations and visual aides.

Road training will occur in a dual control car. Groups of at least two, no larger than four students are assigned for each driving period and take turns in observing and driving.

A Student Certificate of Completion (MV-285), blue card, will be issued to a student who:

- Successfully Completes course in good standing; and
- Achieve a grade of 65 or better in the classroom instruction and 65 or better in the laboratory instruction and;
- Meet the 24 hours classroom and 24 hour laboratory course attendance requirements.

## Meet This will allow students to :

This will allow the student to get a class D license when they are 17 years old, instead of waiting until they turn 18. Without the blue card they will have a Junior License (DJ) which has driving restrictions. Generally, they will also get a reduction in their insurance because they completed the driver's education class.

## **Prerequisite:**

Students must be 16 sixteen (16) years of age on or before the first day of class. Students must have their permit at least. Parents/ guardians must sign written consent for students to participate in the course. A waiting list will be created with seniors given priority then juniors. Date of birth will be used as a factor . (1/2 year course-1 semester)

Mr. Cotton is the teacher, and we appreciate his willingness to take the courses last summer to become certified, allowing our district the opportunity to offer this.



# School Based Health Center and New Signs at Adirondack!

The construction has begun on the School Based Health Center (located in the Middle/High School). A School Based Health Center is like a mini doctor's office/urgent care, right in school. No students are seen without parent consent and involvement. More information will be coming to parents in the coming months. We have a contract with Upstate Family Health Center to be the medical provider. They already operate School Based Health Centers in Utica and Waterville. We are hopeful that our opening will be in September of 2023.

The ACS STEAM Program is proud to announce that they will be ready to compete in the First Tech Challenge (FTC) in the 2023-24 season. The First Tech Challenge is a global competition in which teams compete in head to head robotics matches versus other teams. FTC teams are challenged to design, build, program, and operate robots to meet unique objectives selected every year. Guided by adult coaches and mentors, students develop STEAM

gram, and operate robots to meet unique objectives selected every year. Guided by adult coaches and mentors, students develop STEAM skills and practice engineering principles, while realizing the value of hard work, innovation, and working as a team.


This year Adirondack High School had a class of seven seniors who piloted the FTC program. The RoboCats were asked to build a robot, program it, and work to accomplish various tasks. The students also visited a FTC competition at MVCC to observe how an actual competition is set up and run. Going forward into 2023-24, the FTC class will continue, but students in the class will also compete in local events and become full members of the FTC program. The mission objectives for the robots are announced each September, so next fall students in the FTC class will eagerly await the announcement of the game and prepare to compete.

Students who participate in the FTC will be inspired to become science and technology leaders as they build their self confidence, communication skills, and leadership. Not only does First offer great chances to build knowledge with STEAM education, but students also qualify for scholarship opportunities post high school. There are currently 107 institutions of higher learning offering scholarships to FTC competitors, ranging from 1,000 to 100,000 dollars. Eight New York State colleges and universities (Adelphi, Clarkson, Hofstra, MVCC, RPI, RIT, Syracuse, and the Webb Institute) offer scholarships to incoming students.

## ACS Developing Plans for Therapy Dog Program

Welcoming four-legged friends into the classroom is a growing trend across the country. Time and time again, research shows that therapy-dog programs provide significant benefits for students, teachers, and the entire school community. Therapy dogs help with everything from trauma to reading interventions to a positive



school climate. They help children learn social skills, prevent social isolation, improve emotional well-being, and contribute to a child's cognitive development. Some of the key benefits of therapy dogs in schools include:



- Improved reading skills
- Enhanced higher thinking skills
- Stimulating memory and problem solving
- Increased school attendance
- Improved learning environment and enhanced student motivation to learn
- Growth in confidence level
- Reduced student anxiety levels
- And many more.....

There is a distinct difference between service dogs and therapy dogs. Service dogs help individuals with specific disabilities, such as visual impairment or seizure disorders. Therapy dogs

provide comfort and support. They are trained to use their social instincts and learned social skills to provide health, socialemotional, and cognitive benefits.

We are excited to announce that we are in the development phase of our very own Adirondack Central School Therapy Dog Program. Our goal is to have therapy dogs in place at ACS by the start of the 2023 school year. A group of interested staff members have been meeting over the last few months to explore options, identify resources, understand the therapy dog certification process and develop a plan for implementation at ACS.

The therapy dog certification process is a very prestigious, detailed and stringent process in order to ensure the safety and health of the dogs, students, and staff; but also to ensure that maximum benefit is achieved from having the dogs in school. So over the next few months we will be working with dog trainers to ensure the obedience and training of the dogs is where it needs to be; with therapy dog certification programs to work through the certification process; and then finally, to start introducing the dogs to the school community.

So stay tuned to more details about the Adirondack Central School Therapy Dog program coming in the next few months. We are very excited about what this program will bring to our school community!

American Heart Association₀ **CPR** (article by Sandy Mercer, District Nurse)

Fawn Henry has been an American Heart Association Certified BLS Instructor since 2006 and has taught classes for school staff, coaches and community members for the last 17 years. I am a new American Heart Association Certified BLS Instructor, certified in October 2022. Since November I have held several small classes for coaches, transportation staff and our Administration Team. (I am thrilled to announce I've certified 21 ADK members since November).

As an American Heart Association BLS Instructor we can teach variety of classes including:

- AHA BLS Provider (for healthcare personnel)
- AHA Heartsaver CPR/AED
- AHA Heartsaver First Aid CPR/AED
- AHA Heartsaver Pediatric First Aid CPR/AED
- AHA Heartsaver for K-12 Schools
- AHA Heartsaver First Aid Only
- AHA Heartsaver Bloodborne Pathogens



AHA classes are offered as traditional classroom courses or blended courses. Blended courses are taken online using a self paced format followed by a hands-on skills session with an instructor to complete the skills testing requirements.

Hands-Only CPR has received a lot of attention in the past couple of months. Learning Hands-Only CPR allows people who are not CPR AED certified to respond immediately to a teen or adult who suddenly collapses. I will be conducting Hands-Only CPR training throughout the District during the month of February and into March. I will be presenting training at the faculty meetings and will be

visiting all of the 4th and 5th grade classrooms. In addition, the High School physical education teachers provide Hands-Only CPR training to 9-12th grade students each year in September.

## Why Learn Hands-Only CPR?

Cardiac arrest – an electrical malfunction in the heart that causes an irregular heartbeat (arrhythmia) and disrupts the flow of blood to the brain, lungs and other organs – is a leading cause of death. Each year, more than 350,000 EMS-assessed outof-hospital cardiac arrests occur in the United States.

When a person has a cardiac arrest, survival depends on immediately receiving CPR from someone nearby.

According to the American Heart Association, about 90 percent of people who suffer out-of-hospital cardiac arrests die. CPR, especially if performed immediately, can double or triple a cardiac arrest victim's chance of survival.

## Be the Difference for Someone You

If you are called on to give CPR in an emergency, you will most likely be trying to save the life of someone you love: a child, a spouse, a parent or a friend.

## Call 911

The telecommunicator on the other end of the line can assist you while getting the emergency help you need on the way.

## Music Can Save Lives

Song examples include "Stayin' Alive" by the Bee Gees, "Crazy in Love" by Beyoncé featuring Jay-Z, "Hips Don't Lie" by Shakira" or "Walk the Line" by Johnny Cash. People feel more confident performing Hands-Only CPR and are more likely to remember the correct rate when trained to the beat of a familiar song.

When performing CPR, you should push on the chest at a rate of 100 to 120 compressions per minute, which corresponds to the **beat of the song examples above.**
